- I. Introduction. (I Timothy 5:1-3)
 - Paul instructs Timothy, a young man.
 - We have responsibilities toward Elderly.
 - We have some limits in how we correct them.
 - Our study will focus on God's view of older people, great Bible characters who did much in older years, our responsibilities, and what young people can do now.
- II. What does the Bible say about the Elderly?
 - Gray hair a crown of glory.
 - OT Law required people to stand up and honor the elderly.
 - Old age associated with experience and wisdom.
 - Old age brings pains, fear, and uncertainty of life. Life and vigor diminish.
- III. Bible Characters who did much when Old.
 - Abraham.
 - Moses.
 - Joshua and Caleb.
 - Daniel.
 - God can use older people today.
- IV. What are my responsibilities?
 - Cannot sharply rebuke an older man.
 - Treat older women as mothers.
 - We have a financial responsibility to care for our relatives.
 - Honor Father and Mother.
 - Visit widows in their affliction.

- 5. What is said concerning the church's financial responsibility if a widow has believing children? I Timothy 5:16
- 6. Based on the instructions in I Timothy 5, can the church offer *continual* care of Widowers (males who have lost their wives) or Orphans? Justify your answer.
- 7. How does the Bible describe a person who will not take care of his own relatives?
- 8. How were the Pharisees in Mark 7 justifying their lack of financial support for their parents?
- 9. Name some things you are doing or plan to do toward fulfilling the needs of older people.
- 10. Parents care for their children when they are young. But as parents and children age, the roles can be reversed in later years. Explain how this happens.
